What does it mean tobe a disciple of Jesus Christ?

We have all heard it said when someone becomes a Christian, "they invited Jesus into their heart." I cannot help but wonder what that actually means. Does the Christian life merely consist of a one-time prayer or decision? Does that one time prayer secure for us a sure passage to heaven, or is going to heaven the only motivation for praying that prayer? Lest you think I am trying to create doubt in your mind I do believe our walk with God begins with a decision, a decision that requires us to surrender control of our life to a loving and gracious God. The Christian life without a doubt begins with us receiving the gift of salvation offered to us through the shed blood of Jesus Christ. It requires us to accept the offer God extends to us. (John 1:12). "But as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God, even to those who believe in His name."

To my understanding however, the Bible speaks more of being a disciple of Christ, a follower of Jesus, then merely the making of a decision. At least twenty times in the gospels we find Jesus using the words, "follow me." Often people get stuck on the decision to receive Christ and live their lives as if that is all there is. It is a bit like planning a vacation and then staying at home and read the map for two weeks.

Although using the term Christian is biblical, the words "follower of Jesus" might better describe our journey of faith. In the biblical sense the term Christian means to be Christ-like. To some believers the term Christian represents a position arrived at rather than the beginning of a life-long journey with God. On the other hand, the term "follower of Jesus" has the idea of growth, adventure, movement, and progress. This idea declares that we are on a journey with the God who loves us and has saved us. (Luke 9:23-24)

Here are a few characterisitics of a follower of Jesus Christ.

A follower of Jesus Christ reads the Bible with the intent of hearing God speak and responding in obedience to what they hear Him saying (John 8:31).

A follower of Jesus seeks to live in accordance with God's word and allows it to transform his or her life.

A follower of Jesus lives an exemplary life based on the character and example of Jesus Christ. (cp. John 13:15; 1 Corinthians 11:1; Ephesians 5:1).

A follower of Jesus has a living active relationship with God. It is more then simply living a religious life of doing good and going to church.

A follower of Christ is actively showing and telling others how to become a disciple of Jesus, thereby fulfilling the great commission. In Matthew 28:19-20 Jesus teaches a passionate pursuit of making more disciples. (cp. II Tim. 2:1-2; Acts 1:8)

Therefore, biblical discipleship implies a deeper commitment and more active involvement then merely accepting Jesus into your heart. Although a commitment to Christ is where it must start it is only the beginning of a most worthy adventure. I invite you to come on board and join me on this journey of being a follower, a true disciple of Jesus Christ.

FROM THE PASTOR

It was just before the Passover Festival. The streets filled with the bustling of crowds eager to settle into Jerusalem to celebrate the Festival with family and friends. There was excitement in the air that was palatable. The Disciples were enjoying their meal and conversation when Jesus did the unthinkable. He rose from the table, took off his outer clothing and wrapped a towel around his waist. The room filled with confusion as Jesus poured water into a basin and lowered himself towards his disciples' feet.

This is not what rabbi's do. Rabbi's are above their disciples, they are followed and mimicked by them. Rabbi's do not serve them. Yet, we see Jesus doing exactly that...serving. In verse 15, Jesus says:

"I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you."

Jesus washes the feet of the Disciples and tells them that they are not above him and should do as He did. Think about that for a moment. Jesus calls his disciples to serve as he served. Jesus modeled that belonging to him should result in serving. Not because of some mistaken sense of obligation, but from a joyful desire to be like Jesus. In verse 17, Jesus informs the disciples and us:

"Now that you know these things, you will be blessed if you do them."

Serving like Jesus leads to blessing in in life. The blessing is being like Jesus. The truth is very simple; when we serve like Jesus, we become more like Jesus and are blessed through it. So, perhaps it is time for every one of us to wrap a towel around our waist, fill a basin of water and start washing feet. Ask yourself, "Am I serving like Jesus and experiencing the blessing that comes with it?" If you are not serving...grab a towel. If you are serving...serve like Jesus.
