OUR HIGH PRIEST ON THE CROSS

Have you ever been given something you didn't know you needed? I remember ridiculous ads on TV when I was a kid, that promised to change how your life functioned. These ads promised everything from the "Veg-O-Matic" making julienne fries to the perfect haircuts from the Amazing Flowbee. Of course, most of these ads did not truly make good on their claims, but occasionally something would, and we wouldn't know what to do without them now. Items like the "Ove'glove" saved many a burnt hands when pulling something out of the oven. That's how life is. There are things we had not thought of before we learned of them and the value of what they did.

It is similar in our faith. Consider Hebrews 9:7

"But only the high priest entered the inner room, and that only once a year, and never with out blood, which he offered for himself and for the sins the people had committed in igno rance."

As a modern westerner I have no context for understanding my need of a High Priest. I did not grow up in a system where someone needed to intercede on my behalf for anything. It is in learning what the role of the High Priest was that helped me deepen in my understanding of Jesus. Once I learned of that role, I was unable to separate it from my understanding of Jesus.

The High Priest in the Old Testament had a very interesting and important role. The High Priest represented Israel to God. He made intercession for the people's sins, both the ones they knew about, and the ones done in ignorance. Hebrews 9:7 alludes to this truth

Leviticus 4:13-21 addressed the sacrifices offered for "the whole congregation of Israel "sins through ignorance" (4:13). The leaders of Israel identified the slaying of the bull as a sacrifice for the nation's sins both known and unknown.

Jesus continually moved in the direction of our salvation. He regularly spoke of the work that needed to be accomplished, the "baptism" that He needed to undergo and the desire to see His followers united. John 17 is highlighted appropriately as Jesus' High Priestly prayer. In it He makes intercession for us. But there is a prayer of intercession that Jesus makes that is directly linked to Him being our High Priest, that I believe should be understood as High Priestly:

Luke 23:34

Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."


I had no idea that this prayer from the cross carried so much weight. Jesus made intercession for the sin of ignorance of the people while He suffered on the cross.

He sits at the right hand of the Father making intercession for us daily.

Hebrews 7:25

"Therefore he is able to save completely those who come to God through him, because he always lives to intercede for them."

What a wonderful High Priest we have!

In my late 20's, I started to feel as if these wordly things were not enough and began to feel shame and depression after doing them. When I met Christina and started a relationship with her we had the conversation about God.
